

Safeguarding

Hitting and smacking is not a positive way to manage behaviour and using an implement (object) to hit children with is illegal. Safeguarding the pupils at the academy is paramount and when concerns arise, we have trained Designated Safeguarding Leads, who manage the concerns and any referrals that may need to be made. Finding positive ways to build respect and manage behaviour is better and will have a longer lasting impact.

- 1. It is too easy for a frustrated parent to cross the line from smacking to abusing. Unfortunately, by the time the anger clears, many parents have crossed the line from smacking to hitting, shaking, slapping and other forms of child abuse.
- 2. Smacking makes a child feel helpless and damages self-esteem.
- Smacking teaches aggressive behaviour. Children who are smacked learn to handle some problems by hitting or threatening to hit. Others find their anger hard to then process and can take it out on their peers.
- Smacking usually leads to more misbehaviour.
- Smacking can damage your relationship with your child. It can put an emotional wedge between parent and child. Children depend on their parents to care for them.
- 6. Smacking often leaves the parent feeling quilty.
- 7. There are many more effective methods of discipline. These methods not only solve behaviour problems but also help build such qualities of character as responsibility, cooperation, courage, respect and self-esteem.







School Uniform


Expected Uniform:

Commonwealth Week

All classes really enjoyed Commonwealth Week and all that they learnt. The children found out different facts about the member countries, locating them on maps and using atlases. All classes took time to look at and found out about St. Kitts and Nevis, our main focus as a school, but each class also looked at a different country that is part of the Commonwealth, including India, Cyprus, Jamacia, Malaysia and Kenya. Different aspects of life in these countries were looked at covering climate, culture, popular food and more.







This half term we had a healthy eating day where all the children looked at what makes up a healthy, balanced diet. Children explored different food groups, sorted foods into healthy and unhealthy, learnt to measure portions of fruit and vegetables by measuring a handful. They also identified the benefits of having a balanced diet: fruits and vegetables give us fibre, minerals and vitamins, diary products are a great source of calcium (which is good for the bones and teeth) and the main nutrients from meat are proteins. Remember exercise and balanced diets are important to stay healthy!

Decades Day 1920s - 1990s



Last week we had a history day where each class looked at a different decade in detail. Everyone looked at a selection of themes and how things were different in that decade. These themes were covered by each class: Music, Homes, Clothes and Significant People as well as Toys, Technology, Food, Sweets, TV and Film.

We tried to cover all the decades across the school, however, there was one that was not included. Can you figure out which decade that is? The teachers took the opportunity to all dress up according to the decade their class was studying.

During the day Year 6 travelled back in time to the 1940s. They began the day with a theatre workshop where they met a teacher from the 1940s and were evacuated. Children worked in role as children, teachers and residents of the village to imagine how evacuees would have felt and how they would have been treated. They had the chance to work with historical artefacts and have a hands-on experience of life on the home front.

Everyone had a great day and the children enjoyed seeing the teachers in all their different outfits.
